Aggression Replacement Training (ART) is a cognitive-behavioral intervention designed to help children and adolescents improve social skill competence and moral reasoning, better manage anger, and reduce aggressive behavior.

Healthy Relationships(5704YZH-a)

As part of the Alternatives to Sexual Assault Program (A.S.A.P.), an eight-week module is provided to introduce youth referred to the program to the building blocks of healthy relationships. The module is based on a curriculum developed by an organization called Think Marriage. The relationship-building module is a part of the A.S.A.P. treatment program. This group is specific to girls at risk for sex trafficking and focuses on the following:
ATTITUDES Challenge girls' ideas about commercial sexual exploitation (including prostitution) emphasizing that the commercial sex industry is dangerous and debilitating, not glamorous
KNOWLEDGE Share information about what makes girls vulnerable to exploitation and what tactics pimps use to recruit girls
SKILLS Empower girls to identify and avoid recruitment tactics OR identify supports and resources in exiting the Life

Making Proud choices:

This curriculum aims to help teens engage in less risky behaviors and understand that they are vulnerable. It will give them the following tools:
Emphasis that abstinence from sexual behavior is the most effective way to eliminate these risks. Information regarding the practices of safer sex and condom use
Cognitive skills that will allow them to analyze their beliefs about personal risks and consequences, especially regarding pregnancy, and sexually transmitted infections (including HIV). The skills to look inside themselves to understand their feelings and thoughts. The skills and confidence to look at the interactions between themselves and others to define and choose behaviors that reduce their risks. The motivation and empowerment to apply these skills to their everyday lives

This service provides an opportunity for helping the parents of youth involved in Children's Court to develop insight into their child's behavior and their own parenting styles, and to learn essential parenting skills, such as nurturing, positive communication, parent modeling, and stress management. In addition, many youth referred to the Milwaukee County Children's Court are, or are about to be, parents themselves, with their own children placed with relatives or in DHS foster homes. Involvement with Children's Court is an opportunity to educate these youth about the responsibilities of parenting, stress management, child development, and other topics geared towards helping the youth to be an effective parent. Parent Education participants should also learn about the availability of, and access to, community resources for their family, including prenatal and pediatric care, credit and budgeting counseling, landlord/tenant issues, etc. The agency must have on file with CCSN Administration current separate parent education curricula for parents of youth involved in Children's Court and youth involved in Children's Court who are or are about to be parents. Some of the topics for the curricula may be overlapping. The number of hours necessary to provide the curriculum to an individual should be included on the curriculum documentation. Referrals may be made to the agency to serve parents of the youth involved in Children's Court and/or youth involved with Children's Court who are or are about to be parents.

Milwaukee County Accountability Program (MCAP)

MCAP is an alternative to placement within the state juvenile correctional institution at Lincoln Hills School. The first phase of this program is no longer than 5 months and is located within the secure detention facility in Milwaukee County. This placement easily affords youth and their families to visit on weekends and communicate regularly. Family support is essential as youth participate and comply with requirements of the program. Initially, families indicate their support and cooperation through a signed agreement.

The community placement or aftercare phase is for the balance of youth's court order and home passes or visits home may begin with the youth's probation officer's permission during the last month of the youth's placement in detention. For the crucial first 6 months, each youth has 60 day in court reviews so the Judges be apprised and can help reinforce progress or not the lack of it.

Education, cognitive intervention, AODA education and counseling, and restorative justice activities are the program components, with Running Rebels Community Organization assigning a monitor at the youth's placement in the program, and provide monitoring services while the youth is in the community, either on a home pass or after release from phase 1. GPS monitoring is an important feature of this program, starting with home passes, as the use of 72 hour secure detention placements for investigation of violation of conditions of supervision.

Burglary/Auto Theft Monitoring Program (BAMP)

This program provides monitoring for up to 20 youth at a time who were involved in burglaries or auto thefts. The dosage of monitoring for the BAMP is less intensive than for the Targeted Monitoring program for youth in the SCOP and Firearms components. The targeted population for the BAMP is higher-risk, generally first time offenders referred on a burglary or auto theft. Youth may be referred to the program prior to disposition as a means of early intervention and can continue through the youth being placed on probation. Youth in this program do not have to be court ordered but as deemed appropriated by DCSD.

Serious Chronic Offenders Program (SCOP) and Firearm Program (FA)

SCOP and FA components provide intensive monitoring, structured programming and accountability in community-based settings targeting youth involved with serious or multiple offending behaviors (SCOP) or targeting youth involved with Firearms (Firearm). Participating youth have been adjudicated delinquent and placed on probation, supervised by a Human Service Worker. The majority of youth, due to the severity of their behavior(s) have been determined by the Court to be a high enough risk to warrant placement within a juvenile correctional facility. Thus, many youth may be on a stayed orders for commitment to the

Division of Juvenile Corrections. Youth participate in this program for typically one year, but may be shorter or longer based on the court order and their needs.

A True Aftercare Program (ATAC)

ATAC is for youth that have graduated from any of the Targeted Monitoring Programming (SCOP, FA, BAMP, and MCAP) and their siblings. It is designed to be a voluntary preventative program for the siblings of youth involved in the juvenile justice system, as well as continuing to provide support and positive programming for youth in their TMP.

Functional Family Therapy

Saint A provides Functional Family Therapy (FFT), free of charge, to eligible families. FFT is a well-established, evidence-based, family therapy model aimed at the treatment of youth who have violent, criminal, behavioral, school and conduct problems, along with their families. FFT is a strengths-based intervention, with a philosophy and belief system about people which includes a core attitude of respectfulness of individual difference, culture, ethnicity and family form. It is family-based, in that the therapists work to achieve a “balanced alliance” with each family member and a focus on relationships vs. individuals. FFT also focuses on risk and protection, with the therapists working to alter ratios/odds, by reducing risks and enhancing individual and relational strengths. FFT is a short-term treatment (3-6 months) strategy that is built on a foundation of respect of individuals, families and cultures.

FFT requires that therapists work with the entire family to elicit change so the youth and family who are referred for FFT should already have the motivation to engage in treatment and the willingness make long-term behavioral changes. In addition, the following are other program criteria that will be considered prior to intake:

- The family must have a youth age 11-18 exhibiting delinquency, violence, substance abuse, conduct/behavior problems and/or family conflict.
- The youth is living with or in the process of reuniting with a family unit that is motivated, available and considered the long-term living arrangement
- Families must commit to participate in services at least one to two hours per week for approximately five months
- In order to provide the best services to the family, therapists will coordinate with other service supports involved with the family such as social workers, school staff, juvenile probation officers and the police department.
- The FFT model is not recommended for youth who fall into the DSM-5 category of an autism spectrum disorder per the diagnosis from a qualified mental health professional

Community Connections:

Southwest Key's Community Connections Program combines the concept of case management and a unique continuum of support services to address the needs of their specific circumstance, discourage acts of delinquent behavior and promotes positive youth development. The services are provided with a trauma-informed approach which is present in every interaction with the youth and family. Youth are referred to the Community Connections program by DHHS Human Service Workers.

Community Connections Staff will provide the following primary services:

- Case Management and Care Coordination
- Linkage and Referral to Community Resources
- Individual and Family Counseling
- Supervision
- 24-hour Crisis Intervention
- Educational Advocacy
- Discharge Planning and Long-Term Supports

Supervision Engagement Program (SEP):

A resource to provide youth with an increased level of engagement and support as needed in an effort to prevent unnecessary sanctions and supervision extensions and to reduce the risk of future recidivism.

Youth Mentoring

Mentors commit to serve as role models for their assigned mentee for a minimum of one year, providing support, encouragement and pro-social lifestyle development opportunities. They act as a resource and confidant to youth when personal and education problems occur and may coordinate meetings with Southwest Key staff and parents, teachers, and other natural supports. Mentors also provide transportation for mentees to and from mentoring activities, as needed.

Outreach and Tracking (Level II and GPS)

Serves male and female court involved youth and is specifically designed to address the community's need for safety, to hold the young person accountable for his/her actions, and to increase the youth's competencies to effect long-term and sustainable change. Clients must report their whereabouts in the community at all times. It is the client's responsibility to be in a location in which he/she can be found by the tracker on duty. Caseworkers have a minimum of two face to face visits per day, seven days per week, 365 days per year with each client.

Juvenile Educational Treatment Initiative (JETI)

Previously known as Day Treatment, this program serves youth between the ages of 12 through 17 and provides structured activities, including group, individual and family counseling, substance abuse education, prevention and treatment, advocacy, along with case management services. The youth are maintained in their current schools and the program works closely with the youth's schools and families, providing in home services as needed, using a trauma informed approach and evidence based programming. A pilot is currently being developed for 2016 in conjunction with Milwaukee Public Schools, which will focus on targeted schools that have a large population of high risk youth involved with the juvenile justice system.

Bus tickets will be provided for youth in need of transportation; and transportation to and from off-site activities will be provided. Wisconsin Community Services will provide snacks when the youth arrive to the site, and dinner each day they attend the program. Incentives will be issued for those who participate, five (5) dollar gift card for weekly attendance and youth with restitution will have this incentive paid directly to the court.

Evening Reporting Center

The Evening Reporting Center is a community based alternative to detentions that helps youth and pre-dispositional youth remain arrest-free, reduce recidivism and minimize risk taking and delinquent behaviors during and after program participation.

Saturday Alternatives to Sanctions Program

The Saturday Alternative Sanction Program provides a community-based alternative to detention for sanctions placement for youth who violate the conditions of their probation. The program provides a timely response that holds youth accountable relative to their violations and engages them in positive and constructive programming. The program consists of structured activities based upon best practices and evidence-based curriculums targeting Pro-Social Thinking Patterns
