Milwaukee, WI (Sept. 29, 2014) – Originally the celebration of Bavarian Crown Prince Ludwig's marriage to Princess Therese von Sachsen-Hildburghausen, the annual Oktoberfest event continues in Milwaukee more than two centuries later as an opportunity to experience Gemütlichkeit — good friends, good beer, and good food. Celebrations are being held in several Milwaukee County Parks. Visitors under 21 must be accompanied by an adult.

The celebration has begun. Weekends through Oct. 18, visitors will enjoy Spanferkel or pig roasts, games, and fun for the family. Saint Francis Brewing Co., the operator of the beer garden, will offer specials on Gluttony Oktoberfest beer through the end of the season. ## MKE Oktoberfest Comes to Pere Marquette Parke and the Marcus Center

Oct. 3- 5, Pere Marquette Park and the Marcus Center for the Performing Arts will take on the spirit of Munich. The event, a partnership between Old German Beer Hall, Westown Association and the Marcus Center, begins with a ceremonial keg tapping by Mayor Tom Barrett in Pere Marquette Park at noon. Free beer from the first keg will be served, while the keg lasts.

German bands, polka bands, European folk bands and more will entertain throughout the weekend. Glockenspiel, a human replica of a German cuckoo clock, will perform on the Marcus Center Grounds every two hours. Special competitions providing participant and spectator entertainment include Masskrugstemmen, or stein-holding, and a bratwurst-eating relay. A polka mass will start the day on Sunday.

Food and beverage items for sale are plentiful. Specialties available include chicken Schnitzel, Spanferkel, and a variety of sausages from Usinger's Wursthaus—and, of course, giant Bavarian pretzels with Obatzter (cheese). Three of the "Big Six" Munich breweries represented are Hofbräu, Hacker-Pschorr, and Paulaner.

Hours are Friday and Saturday, noon-11 p.m.; and Sunday, 11a.m.-6 p.m. at the Marcus Center, and noon-6 p.m. at Pere Marquette Park. The park is located at 900 N. Plankinton Ave.; the Marcus Center is across the street.

Oct 10-12, two Sprecher Brewing fire trucks, complete with beers on tap, will make their stop at Milwaukee Oktoberfest in Cathedral Square. The event organizer, Swarmm Events, chose the new location for a "bigger and better Oktoberfest." The event benefits the Hunger Task Force.
