Deputies Arrest 10 Drunken Drivers in Operation Drive Sober 1352 Repeat Offenders Since January 2010

Milwaukee, WI – Sheriff David A. Clarke Jr. has ordered a continued aggressive weekend Driving Under the Influence (DUI) initiative to rid the Milwaukee County freeway system of drunken drivers. This weekend's Operation Drive Sober initiative, from Friday at 4:00 p.m. through Sunday at 6:00 a.m., resulted in the arrest of ten drunken drivers. The average PBT result was .14.

Repeat offenders arrested were Isaac Taylor, age 37, of Milwaukee, for felony DUI-4th; Alfonso Flores, age 33, of Milwaukee, Bobby Longoria, age 30, of Oak Creek; and Cesar Cervantes Del Valle, age 26, of Milwaukee; all for DUI-2nd offense.

First-time offenders taken into custody were Milwaukee residents Emmanuel Garcia-Acuna, age 30; Brian Schild, age 40; Jeffrey Mosley, age 30; and Derrick Perkins, age 24; Benjamin Stege, age 27, of Cedarburg; and Erik Peterson, age 24, of St. Francis.

Felony DUI-4th

Isaac Taylor, age 37, of Milwaukee, was found by a deputy asleep behind the wheel of vehicle southbound on I43 near W. Becher Street at 4:20 a.m. Saturday, August 22. After being awakened by the deputy, he said he had pulled over after his vehicle became disabled. Taylor tested a .30 on the PBT. Deputies found a glass pipe and a corner cut baggie of crack cocaine.

His prior convictions for drunken driving were in September 2006, July 2010, and January 2014. Because his last conviction was within five years of this offense, the charge is elevated to a felony offense. If convicted on this fourth arrest, he faces up to six years in prison.
