Mayor Scaffidi called the Executive Council of the MMSD meeting to order at 1:05 p.m. A quorum was present.

I. Welcome to the Village of River Hills

Village President Bob Brunner welcomed the members to River Hills, the smallest of the suburban Milwaukee County communities. River Hills is

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comprised of 600 families, with a population of 1,600. It was incorporated in 1930, and is only zoned for single-family residential units. Other facilities such as the University School are governed by special use permits.

Ms. Polly Morris, Director of the Lynden Sculpture Garden, is with him today. She spoke and said the Sculpture Garden was the home of Harry and Peg Bradley. The land was purchased in the late 1920's. In 1962, the Bradley's began collecting the monumental sculptures that are spread across the 40 acres of land here. The garden was opened to the public in 2010. It is open 6 days a week, offering K-12 programs for children, adult workshops, exhibitions, events, etc.

Chairman Taylor arrived.

II. Approval of the November 11, 2013 Minutes

It was moved by Mayor Neitzke, seconded by President Hayward, to approve the minutes. The motion carried unanimously.

III. Report of the Commissioners

Commissioner West said the Operations Committee discussed the following:

- Approved the 30th Street Industrial Corridor North Stormwater Plan
- Declaration of the Public Necessity and Approval of the Acquisition Plat (Relocation Order) for the 30th Street Corridor Wet Weather Relief

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- Authorized the Executive Director to enter into an agreement for Records Management Software, Implementation, and Maintenance Services with the TAB Corporation
- Destruction of District Records pursuant to Commission Policy
- Approved contract with Greenseams Program Implementation for a three-year period from 2014 through 2016
- Authorized the Executive Director to approve computer-related purchases for 2014 from Regional Governmental Entities and General Services Administration pricing bid lists
- Authorized the Executive Director to extend a one-year contract for life insurance benefits with Humana effective 1/1/14
- Authorized the Executive Director to extend the contract for Stop Loss Insurance for the Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District Group Health Insurance with Symetra Life Insurance Company
- Authorized the Executive Director to extend the contracts for Supplemental Health Insurance, Prescription Drug Coverage, and Vision Insurance for Post Medicare Retirees
- Listed positions exempt from the Financial Disclosure Requirements of the Code of Conduct for the Calendar Year 2014

President Brunner had a question about the contract for over one million dollars for Greenseams. He asked if it is over one million dollars per year. Mr. Shafer said the three-year extension contract is for approximately \$300,000 per year.

Mayor Taylor said there were some Greenseams initiatives that were being worked on in Franklin that just seemed to have gone away. He asked if there was a problem with funding for a couple of properties the bank was looking at purchasing. Mr. Shafer said he would look into the matter.

IV. Report from the Executive Director Kevin Shafer

Mr. Shafer recognized Commissioner West for the good job he has done as Chairman of the Commission for the past two years. There is a two-year term limit, and next week a vote will take place for a new Chairman.

Mr. Shafer said there was an article last week about downspout disconnection. He discussed this last summer with the Technical Advisory Team, along with

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Milwaukee and Shorewood. A process will start to look at disconnecting downspouts in combined sewer areas where it is feasible. In some places, this will not be feasible. This will be part of the Private Property I&I program, so it is reimbursable through the program where all the communities are being reimbursed for PPI&I. Mr. Shafer met with Milwaukee's Public Works committee last week and will meet with Shorewood's Public Works committee soon.

Mayor Taylor said Commissioner West has done a great job as Commission Chairman.

V. Schedule Future Meetings

Mayor Taylor said the ICC has been invited to participate in a meeting with the U.S. Air Force, although the next meeting was scheduled for St. Francis.

VI. Adjournment

It was moved by President West, seconded by Mayor Scaffidi, to adjourn the Executive Council of the MMSD meeting of December 9, 2013 at 1:15 p.m. The motion carried unanimously.

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Mayor Tom Taylor called the Intergovernmental Cooperation Council of Milwaukee County (ICC) meeting to order at approximately 1:20 p.m., as a quorum was present.

I. Welcome to the Village of River Hills

Village President Bob Brunner welcomed the members to River Hills. He spoke about a satisfaction study, of which 33% of residents responded and gave exceptionally high marks to police, public works, and administration.

He then introduced Polly Morris, Executive Director of the Lynden Sculpture Garden. She distributed a catalog of the Garden's first six exhibitions. The sculpture collection on the grounds includes 50 permanent sculptures from the '60's and '70's, as well as contemporary works. The Garden does a lot of work with living artists, and provides educational services to the southeastern Wisconsin community. There is ice skating and cross-country skiing during the winter months, and the property is open to the public six days per week. Their website, lydensculpturegarden.org, shows all classes, workshops, events, rentals, tours, etc.

II. Approval of the November 11, 2013 minutes of the ICC.

It was moved by President Krueger, seconded by Mayor Devine, to approve the minutes. The motion carried unanimously.

Mayor Neitzke said in the future, resolutions will be inserted into the body of the minutes.

III. Review the contracts of shared services between Milwaukee County and the municipalities, including possible discussion and decision regarding shared services resolution

Mayor Taylor said everyone should have a copy of a revised resolution regarding Act 14. The only changes made to the document were those requested by County Executive Abele. The language on page two of the resolution, under Be It Further Resolved, changes the 45 day review to 30 days. He also deleted language under that clause that the County Executive said was superfluous, stating that the ICC can't start to consider a contract until after 30 days has passed. Mayor Taylor explained other language he deleted at the end of the resolution, as that was more for informational purposes to this body.

The reason the changes were made is to speed up the process. If there are intergovernmental cooperation agreements over \$300,000 that after a certain

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amount of time lapses the ICC does not act on, it will be considered there is no problem with the agreement.

Mr. Eric Peterson, Milwaukee County Board, asked for another change on behalf of the County Executive. On page two of the resolution, under Be It Further Resolved, he wanted the "at least 30 days prior thereto" language stricken on line seven. Thirty days, coupled with your next meeting, still leaves a 59-day window. The County's intention is to get a contract immediately to the ICC for action.

It was moved by President Johnson, seconded by Mayor Scaffidi, to accept the revised shared services resolution, as presented. The motion carried unanimously.

A RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR THE PROCEDURAL
ADMINISTRATION OF THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL CREATED PURSUANT TO
WIS. STAT. § 59.794(1)(d)

WHEREAS, Section 33. of 2013 Wisconsin Act 14, created Wis. Stat. § 59.794, entitled "Milwaukee County; limitations on board authority and on intergovernmental cooperation, shared services", effective June 2, 2013; and

WHEREAS, Wis. Stat. §§ 59.794(1) and (2) provide as follows:

"(1) Definitions. In this section:

- (a) "Agreement" means an intergovernmental cooperation agreement under s. 66.0301, or a contract to provide consolidated services under s. 59.03 (2) (e), entered into by a county and another local governmental unit that is located wholly within that county.
- (b) "Board" means the board of a county.
- (c) "County" means a county with a population of 750,000 or more.
- (d) "Executive council" means a body that consists of the mayor of a 1st class city, and the elected executive officer of every city and village that is wholly located within the county and who is also a member of the executive council as described in s. 200.23 (2) (b).

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- (e) "Local governmental unit" has the meaning given in s. 66.0131 (1) (a).
- (2) Limitation on agreements. (a) Subject to par. (b), before an agreement may take effect and become binding on a county, it must be approved by the executive council. If the county enters into an agreement, the executive council shall meet as soon as practicable to vote on the agreement.
- (b) With regard to an intergovernmental cooperation agreement under s. 66.0301, the requirements under par. (a) apply only to any single contract, or group of contracts between the same parties which generally relate to the same transaction, with a value or aggregate value of more than \$300,000.”; and

WHEREAS, the Intergovernmental Cooperation Council having recognized the duty of it's members who are also members of the "Executive Council" as defined under Wis. Stat. § 59.794(1)(d) to "meet as soon as practicable to vote" on an agreement under Wis. Stat. § 59.794(1)(2)(a), and intending to provide for organizational process for the expediency of such consideration and review, not only by the aforesaid Executive Council, but also as may be necessary by the cities and villages which the elected executive officer Executive Council members represent.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Intergovernmental Cooperation Council of Milwaukee County, that each of it's regularly scheduled meeting agendas shall include an agenda section entitled: "Executive Council: Intergovernmental Cooperation Agreement(s) pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.794(1)(d)", which section shall provide for the aforesaid Executive Council to consider and address intergovernmental cooperation agreement subject matters pursuant to Wis. Stat. §§ 59.794(1) and (2).

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Executive Council pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.794(1)(d), shall act upon intergovernmental cooperation agreement subject matters pursuant to Wis. Stat. §§ 59.794(1) and (2) at the next regular meeting of the Intergovernmental Cooperation Council of Milwaukee County which occurs following the receipt by the aforesaid Executive Council of an intergovernmental cooperation agreement entered into by Milwaukee County submitted for review and approval pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.794(2)(a)-should no regular meeting of the Intergovernmental Cooperation Council of Milwaukee County have been scheduled pursuant to its Bylaws or by action of the Intergovernmental Cooperation Council at a prior meeting so as to occur within 30 days from the receipt of an intergovernmental cooperation agreement from Milwaukee County, a special meeting of the Intergovernmental Cooperation Council of Milwaukee County may be called pursuant to Article VI.2. of the aforesaid Bylaws. In the event that the Executive Council pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.794(1)(d), does not act by a quorum present and voting of the Executive Council upon an

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intergovernmental cooperation agreement previously approved by Milwaukee County within 30 days from its receipt as approved from Milwaukee County, the agreement shall be deemed approved by the Executive Council.

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that pursuant to the constitution of the membership of the Executive Council pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.794(1)(d), only those specified members of the Intergovernmental Cooperation Council of Milwaukee County who are also members of such Executive Council are entitled to vote upon any matter appearing under the meeting agenda Executive Council section created under this Resolution; also as such, Article IX. of the Bylaws of The Intergovernmental Co-operation Council For Milwaukee County and Its Municipalities, as amended, is hereby amended to read as follows:

“Article IX. Executive Councils

1. Executive Council pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 200.23(2)(b).

All of the permanent members of the Council, with the exception of the members from Milwaukee County, the City of Milwaukee and the City of South Milwaukee, at the time of the adoption of these Bylaws, constitute the “executive council” as is set forth in Wis. Stats. § 200.23(2)(b). As such, the Executive Council is comprised of 17 members. The Chairman and the Vice-Chairman of the Intergovernmental Co-operation Council shall also serve in such capacities for the Executive Council. Executive Council members may not appoint a designated representative. The terms and provisions of these Bylaws as are set forth under Articles VI., VII. (except that a quorum of the Executive Council shall be 9 members), XIV. and XV. shall govern the proceedings of the Executive Council. The Executive Council shall perform those functions and duties pursuant to those terms all as are set forth in Wis. Stats. §§ 200.23 and 200.25 as applicable to the Executive Council.

2. Executive Council pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.794(1)(d).

All of the permanent members of the Council, with the exception of the member from Milwaukee County, constitute the “executive council” as is set forth in Wis. Stats. § 59.794(1)(d). As such, the Executive Council is comprised of 19 members. The Chairman and the Vice-Chairman of the Intergovernmental Co-operation Council shall also serve in such capacities for the Executive Council, provided that such Chairman or Vice-Chairman is a member of the Executive Council pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.794(1)(d); if not such a member, such Chairman or Vice-Chairman shall be ineligible for such service. Executive Council members may not appoint a designated representative. The terms and provisions of these Bylaws as are set forth under Articles VI., VII. (except that a quorum of the Executive Council shall be 11 members), XIV. and XV. shall govern the proceedings of the Executive Council,

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except as they may apply to a non-member of the Executive Council pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 59.794(1)(d), who shall be considered ineligible and/or unavailable/absent for such application purposes. The Executive Council shall perform those functions and duties pursuant to those terms all as are set forth in Wis. Stats. §§ 59.794(1) and (2) as applicable to the Executive Council.”

Mr. Peterson said litigation was referenced at last month’s meeting in Oak Creek regarding Act 14. That has not been resolved, and he is not aware of the County Board’s action in any of that litigation at this time.

IV. Updates from the members of the ICC regarding subjects listed below:

1. **MADACC** – No report.
2. **MCFLS** – No report.
3. **EMS** – President Brunner said again there was no quorum at the meeting. Another EMT class will be held in January. The progress of the October class has been reported as very good.
4. **Lakefront Development Commission** – No report.
5. **Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)** – Mayor Neitzke said Greenfield recently received the 2013 community block grant awards in October, which makes it impossible to execute them. He wanted to make sure it is the County’s intention to extend these awards into 2014 when projects can actually be completed.
6. **MCAMLIS** – No report.
7. **Legislative** - Ms. Gonda reported on new issues such as the use of automated license plate readers. The bill would significantly curtail the ability to use them for criminal investigations and parking enforcement. This bill is being modified, so municipalities will continue to have some flexibility in the use of the license plate readers. There is a privacy objection, so one angle is prohibiting the release of some of these records for public records purposes. A proposal is to dump the data within 48 hours of receiving it. For criminal investigations, this does not work. For parking citations, if any license plate collected is not cited, that

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information would have to be dumped within 24 or 48 hours. If a citation is issued, the information can be kept.

A question was asked if there is any issue with open warrants. Ms. Gonda said yes, this all relates to privacy concerns. Chief Oliva said a group of municipalities in Wisconsin has formed an association of license plate readers usage. They have been working on setting up their own standards. He invited Rep. Craig to speak with representatives of this group, and Rep. Craig was very receptive to the concerns raised. Mayor Neitzke related two incidents where license plate readers were used in Greenfield, and it is a vital tool.

Ms. Gonda spoke about legislation which would significantly curtail the role of the Board of Review, change the presumption on those cases, and then require the property owner on any assessment over one million dollars to be given the option of going to the Tax Appeals Commission rather than the Board of Review. Wal-Mart and Walgreens are primarily driving this. The City of Milwaukee has been interested in looking at a statewide tax tribunal for large property tax appeals. Right now, the Tax Appeals Commission does not have the expertise to deal with those.

8. Roundtable Discussion

Mr. Peterson said Supervisor Weishan's Election Commission idea was not included in Milwaukee County's budget. The Economic Development Committee approved an item that would offer zero percent interest, 15-year, \$20,000 loans for foreclosure properties to help reduce the foreclosure crisis.

Mr. Reusch said the dedication and opening of the Alyson Dudek ice rink in Hales Corners was held yesterday. She was the bronze medal winner in the short track relays in 2010. It is hoped she will qualify for the winter Olympics in 2014.

Mayor Taylor said the City of Franklin will hold a special Common Council meeting relating to future business parks. He is bringing up this matter because of the Ryan Creek Interceptor. The idea and the backing of the Ryan Creek Interceptor had to do with the revenue that will be derived from the business parks going to Milwaukee County and the other taxing units. All communities should benefit from that.

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Mayor Neitzke thanked Hales Corners, Greendale and West Allis for their mutual aid regarding the fatal accident on the interstate system yesterday.

President Krueger announced that the closing between Wal-Mart and Lowe's is scheduled for next week. A Wal-Mart on Brown Deer Road is anticipated to open June 1, 2014.

Mayor Hohenfeldt said Cudahy just contracted out for solid waste collection, which will result in a savings of \$220,000 per year. City employees have done this for many years.

V. Items for Future Meetings

Mayor Taylor said Mayor Neitzke should be contacted if anyone has an item for the agenda.

VI. Schedule Future Meeting

Mayor Taylor said the Executive Director of the VEA Center would like to do a brief presentation and host the next meeting at their facility. If not, St. Francis will host the next meeting on January 13, 2014.

VII. Adjournment

It was moved by President Dickman, seconded by Mayor Tepper, to adjourn the ICC meeting of December 9, 2013 at 2:15 p.m.. The motion carried unanimously.

2013 Assembly Bill 8 Date of publication*: **December 13, 2013**

* Section 991.11, WISCONSIN STATUTES: Effective date of acts. "Every act and every portion of an act enacted by the legislature over the governor's partial veto which does not expressly prescribe the time when it takes effect shall take effect on the day after its date of publication."

2013 WISCONSIN ACT 71

AN ACT *to renumber and amend* 29.038 (3); and *to create* 29.038 (3) (b) of the statutes; **relating to:** restrictions imposed by local governmental units on hunting with a bow and arrow or crossbow.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. 29.038 (3) of the statutes is renumbered 29.038 (3) (a) and amended to read:

29.038 (3) (a) ~~A-Except as provided in par. (b),~~ a local governmental unit may enact an ordinance or adopt a regulation, resolution or other restriction that has an incidental effect on hunting, fishing or trapping, but only if the primary purpose is to further public health or safety.

SECTION 2. 29.038 (3) (b) of the statutes is created to read:

29.038 (3) (b) 1. In this paragraph:

a. "Building" means a permanent structure used for human occupancy and includes a manufactured home, as defined in s. 101.91 (2).

b. "Restriction" means an ordinance, regulation, resolution, or other restriction enacted or adopted by a local governmental unit.

2. Except as provided in subd. 3., a local governmental unit may not enact or adopt a restriction that prohibits a person from hunting with a bow and arrow or crossbow within the jurisdiction of that local governmental unit.


3. A local governmental unit may enact or adopt a restriction that does any of the following:

a. Prohibits a person from hunting with a bow and arrow or crossbow within a specified distance, not to exceed 100 yards, from a building located on another person's land. A restriction enacted or adopted under this subd. 3. a. shall provide that the restriction does not apply if the person who owns the land on which the building is located allows the hunter to hunt within the specified distance of the building.

b. Requires a person who hunts with a bow and arrow or crossbow to discharge the arrow or bolt from the respective weapon toward the ground.
