Bucks Arena Financing and Milwaukee County

This month the Economic Development Committee which I chair held the first public committee meeting regarding the Bucks Arena financing and the sale of the Park East land which is immediately north of the proposed arena. While the County Executive has been solely negotiating the financing that will come from Milwaukee County residents, the board of Supervisors must review the sale of the land. The locally elected board has no oversight of the Executive's actions as the State has the ability to approve it through State Legislative action.

Here is a summary of the current negotiations as reported by the Executive. Please note the details have only recently been released by legislators. The Bucks owners will pay \$250 million while various units of government will pay about \$250 million as well. Here is how it breaks down:

\$55 Million - State

Via capital borrowing with an \$80 million cap on the total with interest.

\$47 Million - City of Milwaukee

Milwaukee will tear down the 4th St. parking garage, build a new parking garage on the Park East land and share revenues with the Bucks. The City will also use Tax Incremental financing for borrowing on Park East through a Tax Incremental District (TID). The City receives \$8 million guarantee from the Bucks owners on the construction of the new parking garage for the Bucks share of the garage construction.

\$55 Million - County

Via capital borrowing through the Wisconsin Center District; the debt payment on the bonding is estimated at about \$4 million per year which is to be paid with accelerated collection of county debt, simply called Bad Debt (*see below*)

\$90 Million - Wisconsin Center

The Wisconsin Center is an unelected board with members appointed by various leaders including the Governor, County Executive and Mayor of Milwaukee. In addition to the \$90 million contribution through capital borrowing, the Center shall accomplish a total borrowing of \$200 million with \$55 million each paid off by State and County and the \$90 million paid by the Wisconsin Center District which raises revenue through sales tax charged on food, beverage sales and h/motel room taxes in the district. The proposal also transfers ownership of the Marcus Center, which was originally paid for by county taxpayers. This transfer will leave all the debt connected with the Marcus Center with the county but transfer the asset to the unelected board for oversight.

Sale of Park East Land

The Park East land is abandoned freeway space on McKinley Avenue with an estimated value of just under \$9 million and nearly 9 acres of land comprised of four major blocks west of the Milwaukee River. While the Board will have no oversight of the Arena Financing, the Board does approve land sales, although it is rumored that the County Executive has lobbied to take this power away from local supervisors with the State Legislators in order to avoid having any of the Arena negotiations subject to local oversight. Whether this is true will remain to be seen as the budget process plays out or the Arena Project is removed and dealt with as standalone legislation.

The Bucks proposal is to purchase the land for \$1 in exchange for a promise to provide economic development of the 4 blocks and promises to create both construction jobs and full-time jobs post development jobs of about 1,000 positions. This is actually structured as 3 options on the land in three rolling cycles of 3 years each. Since the option is only exercised if the arena is built, it has been my position that this is actually one transaction, that is the Arena financing and sale of the Park East purchase must all be considered within the terms of one over-arching transaction in order to approve the sale of land (really the gift of land in exchange for the promise of the arena and adjacent development). Bad Debt Collection and the Milwaukee County Portion of Funding the Arena

The County Executive negotiated Milwaukee County's contribution of 55 Million through collection of the county's outstanding liabilities, or "bad debt". Most of this collection comes from delinquent property taxes in addition to other collections such as unpaid court judgments. Currently the county uses a debt collection firm to collect this debt and realizes about \$3.5 Million per year.

Under the new arrangement, the Dept. of Revenue would collect this debt and supposedly has more tools to do collections including tax intercept tools. With the collections, this money is to pay the debt service for the 55 million bond that the county will assume to fund the arena development. The annual payment for payoff of this debt is estimated at 4 million per year. The county's comptroller predicted the county could collect 4 million per year initially but could not sustain this over the life of the bonds. Once the county debt collection falls short, the State will take any short fall out of the shared revenue that comes from the State to fund Milwaukee County programs that are mandated by the State.

I have been vocal in criticizing this plan. [My recent press release criticizing the plan can be found here.](#) This plan is really a shell game, it is ultimately going to either short our state shared revenue or supplant the debt service with more property taxes since the county uses all debt collections to offset property tax collections. Our county property tax payers are only too familiar with the high property taxes paid by homeowners. The last place we should look for funding of an arena by the county is to use property taxes. All non-county users will again enjoy the fruits of moving outside the county lines without having to pay their fair share for the new arena.

While there is strong support for a new arena to keep the Bucks team in Milwaukee, the county executive's plan takes the easy route and does it without oversight by the Board. The State of Wisconsin has the only final say in this arrangement. Since all of the State legislative leaders are elected outside of the county, it will be all too easy for them to once again pile property taxes on those already shouldering the greatest burden of providing our many public parks and cultural amenities to the non-payers. I strongly urge constituents to contact their State Representatives to express their views.

Making this matter even more inequitable is the fact that the City of Milwaukee collects its own property tax delinquencies. This means only the Milwaukee County Suburbs will be included in the delinquent

property tax collections. While the City of Milwaukee obtains an arena, the county suburbs pay most of the 55 Million county contribution. As to the 47 Million of the City's share, this liability is limited to the liability within their Park East Tax Incremental District (TID) for the Park East sale. Otherwise, the property taxpayers in the City of Milwaukee will not contribute like the county suburbs. This is truly not a good deal for our south shore communities.



Gun Club Update

The Cudahy Sportsman Club proposal to move further south in Warnimont Park lost in Parks Committee and went to the Full Board with a recommendation to reject the resolution sponsored by Sup. John Weishan. At the full Board meeting, the matter was referred to Corporation Counsel to provide an opinion on the status of legal title and the right of the club to remain in Warnimont Park. This motion was made under "minority rules" which allows a vote of only six supervisors to delay a final vote. This is quite technical but the matter was delayed for this month and will be taken up again in July.

I have been looking for some solution for the club to perhaps find other sites in the City of Cudahy, such as the large expanse of land behind Patrick Cudahy, which is away from residential neighborhoods, or perhaps some other site within the Park System. I will continue to provide details in the August newsletter.

The Public Hearing that was very well attended on June 3 provided a forum for many groups. It is apparent that the club would like to remain in Warnimont Park, as well as the student Trap Team at the school. Many other groups opposed the move south, including St. Luke's South Shore, the Friends Groups, the Park People, the Dog Park group called ROMP, the Block Watch neighborhood group, Audubon Society, Kelly Center and the many neighbors who have signed a petition opposing the move.

Supervisor Patricia Jursik Thanks The County Board For An Emergency Provision To Fix Pedestrian Foot Bridge

County Supervisor Patricia Jursik thanked the County Board of Supervisors today for attending to an emergency need in South Milwaukee. After the County Executive ignored pleas to replace the Beech Street footbridge over the Oak Creek Parkway, the only means of securing an emergency approval was

through extraordinary actions of the County Board. These actions involved a supermajority vote to suspend rules and then a two-thirds vote to spend \$200,000 in contingency funds to fix the bridge.

Many floods have taken a toll on the Beech Street Pedestrian Bridge in South Milwaukee. Due to limited resources and a long list of deferred maintenance, the bridge kept getting put back together with Band Aids. In May, the bridge finally washed out for the last time, and it was deemed too broken to replace.

Unfortunately, this bridge is the only pedestrian access for school children in the South Milwaukee subdivision west of the Oak Creek Parkway and south of College Avenue to cross on their way to school. Parents, the School Superintendent, teachers, and the Mayor of South Milwaukee all lobbied to get the bridge replaced before the start of school in September for the estimated 200 students who use it. After denial of action by the County Executive's office, a very difficult path remained to find relief before school resumed.

"My colleagues understood that when it is necessary to ensure the safety of school children in crossing the Oak Creek to get to school, it was time to take extraordinary measures," Jursik said. "I want to thank them publicly and tell all of our citizens that the legislative branch of County government really does care for all of our citizens especially the vulnerable such as our school children. The Supervisors listened, and they acted."

On a vote of 14-4, the County Board voted to replace the Beech Street pedestrian bridge over the Oak Creek in time for the new school year.



South Milwaukee Mill Dam DNR Directives

The Department of Natural Resources is extending the deadline for repair of the Mill Dam with several conditions described below.

Timeline History

On November 19, 2012, the Department conducted an inspection of the South Milwaukee Mill Dam. The inspection report includes timeframes for addressing deficiencies and improving the safety and structural integrity of the dam. The timeframe for completing the gate repairs, investigation of masonry, benchmark installation and tree and brush removal was set for June 1, 2014.

On December 4, 2013 Steven A. Elver, P.E., S.E., of AECOM performed a field inspection of the masonry. The inspection report addressed repairs to the masonry stone. At that time Milwaukee County requested an extension to December 31, 2014 to allow time for additional funding to be acquired.

In late 2014 the County performed an in-depth evaluation of the sluice gate to determine why it was inoperable. At that time it was found that the lake drain inlet was covered with approximately 10' feet of sediment. Also the manhole containing the sluice gate makes the repair or replacement difficult in the confined space. At that time Milwaukee County requested an extension to December 31, 2015. The trees and brush have been removed and the directive modified to address the remaining stumps and roots greater than 1 inch.

Preliminary design plans were submitted to the Department in March 2015. The preliminary plans involved removing the existing manhole and constructing a new manhole with a new sluice gate. The manhole and gate would be connected to the existing lake drain intake pipe and the existing outfall pipe. The Department identified concerns with sediment management. Sediment sampling completed in 2001 identified Polycyclic Aromatic Hydrocarbons (PAHs). The Department is concerned that if the gate would be replaced and operated a significant amount of contaminated sediment would be transported downstream and into Lake Michigan.

On April 7, 2015 a conference call was held between Department staff, Milwaukee County staff and Chris Lewis of AECOM.

Extension and Conditions

The Department is extending the deadline for repairs to accommodate the preparation and findings of the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission (SEWRPC) Report of the Oak Creek Watershed. By December 31, 2018, the County shall complete the following:

- Submit Inspection, Operation and Maintenance plan (IOM).
- Inspect the dam regularly, monitoring for seepage and stability of masonry stone. Submit documentation of inspections yearly to the Department.
- Submit the published SEWRPC report.
- Identify long term costs associated with maintaining the dam and impoundment.
- Hold a public information meeting.
- Determine the long term disposition of the dam.

DIRECTIVES

The following deficiencies must be corrected by the dates given:

1. Replace the two missing capstones and reset the shifted capstone on the left abutment.
September 1, 2019
2. Establish benchmarks September 1, 2019
3. Removal of stumps and roots greater than one inch along embankments September 1, 2019
4. Repair or reconstruct sluice gate September 1, 2019

Please note that repairs required under items 3 and 4 above must be designed by an engineer registered in the State of Wisconsin and plans must be submitted to this Department for review and approval before any work is performed on the dam.

If you are unable to meet the schedule proposed above, submit your own schedule, in writing, for completing the required modifications and repairs. In order for us to consider a schedule other than the one we have determined, you must submit your alternative schedule by **September 1, 2015**. If we do not hear from you by then, the schedule we have determined will be in effect.

Milwaukee County Transit System Driver Strike

As of the date of this writing, our bus drivers have taken a strike vote due to an impasse in negotiations with MCTS. We will strive to work with the County Executive's office and Chairman Michael Mayo, Sr. to avoid this strike for the benefit of all our riders. We have had some very positive programs and new routes and it will be a serious setback to see a strike at this time.




