Financial Support for Eligible Caregivers

National Family Caregiver Support Program

Older Americans Act program that provides support and financial resources to informal and family caregivers as they provide important care to their loved ones. Grant funds can be used for supports such as training, home modifications, self-care resources, and respite.

Who can participate?

- Informal caregivers caring for a person aged 60 or older or someone with dementia of any age who is not enrolled in a Medicaid long-term care program or residing in a care facility.
- Grandparents and older relatives aged 55 or older who are primary caregivers for minor children or an adult with a disability.

Alzheimer's Family and Caregiver Support Program

State of Wisconsin program dedicated to enhancing the lives of informal and family caregivers while helping people with dementia remain living in the community as long as possible. Grant funds can be used to provide temporary caregiver respite care and purchase goods and services needed to help care for someone with irreversible dementia.

Who can participate?

- Informal caregivers caring for a person of any age with a diagnosis of Alzheimer's Disease or other dementia when the following apply to the individual with the diagnosis:
 - Resides in a community or home setting
 - Not enrolled in a long-term care program
 - Has a gross annual income of \$48,000 or less (including spousal income). Costs associated with dementia-related care can be deducted when calculating income.
